Soloists

Nola Richardson, Soprano is making her mark as an "especially impressive" (New York Times) soprano. An Australian by birth, she has spent most of her life in the United States and was the 2016 winner of The Bach Choir of Bethlehem/ American Bach Society Young American Singer Competition and a Carmel Bach Festival Virginia Best Adams Fellow in 2019. She has been praised for her "astonishing balance and accuracy," "crystalline diction," and "natural-sounding ease" (Washington Post). Ms. Richardson's wide repertoire spans from music of the medieval period to several world premieres, and she performs frequently throughout the United States. Some highlights of recent seasons include her debut with the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra performing Bach's Cantata 51 and Scarlatti's Su le Sponde del *Tebro*; soloist with the Boston Pops under Keith Lockhart in "Simply Sondheim"; Handel's Messiah with the Colorado Symphony; a tour to Russia, Estonia, and Latvia as soloist in Arvo Pärt's Passio with the Yale Schola Cantorum; the premiere of Michael Gandolfi's Carroll in Numberland (alongside soprano Dawn Upshaw) at Tanglewood; and the First Lady in Clarion Music Society's production of Die Zauberflöte. Ms. Richardson's 2018-19 season featured her debuts with Opera Lafayette, The English Concert, The Baroque Chamber Orchestra of Colorado, and Musica Sacra. 2019-20 included "Baroque Spectacular" with the Voices of Ascension (NY), Faure's Requiem and Mozart's Coronation Mass with the Monmouth Civic Chorale (NY): and The Well-Caffeinated Clavier with the Philharmonic Baroque Orchestra, San Francisco.

Janna Critz, Mezzo-Soprano, has been acclaimed for having "summoned up sonorities that were rich, warm, dark, and comforting" (San Francisco Examiner) and for her "elegance of technique" and "vivid vocalism" (Baltimore Sun). Ms. Critz is a rising artist within the early music, operatic, and concert arena. With her specialization in Baroque repertoire, Ms. Critz has been recognized for her versatility of style and subtle nuance. One of four recipients of the 2015 Carmel Bach Festival Virginia Best Adams Fellowship, and winner

of the 2014 biennial Bethlehem Bach Vocal Competition, Critz has already begun to establish her skill in Baroque performance practice. In January of 2014 she founded Bel pianto, a Baroque ensemble that presents Italian, French, and German vocal music from the early 17th- to mid-18th centuries. For two consecutive years, Critz has been a featured soloist with the American Bach Soloists Festival and Academy performing works such as J. S. Bach's Mass in B Minor, Alessandro Scarlatti's Marc'Antonio e Cleopatra, and Heinrich Biber's Missa Salisburgensis. Most recent performances include the Vivaldi *Magnificat*. The Sorceress from Purcell's Dido and Aeneas, and selected works by Claudio Monteverdi featuring Lamento della Ninfa and Presso un fiume tranquillo. In 2013 Critz made her solo debut with the Richmond Symphony Orchestra in their production of Mozart's Requiem, and in 2012 was the alto soloist for *Voices of Light*, a modern oratorio, by Richard Einhorn with the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Marin Alsop.

Loretta O'Sullivan, Cello, has been acclaimed for her "scrupulous musicianship...gorgeous sound and stylistic acuity" (Washington Post), and is known for her incandescent presence. She is engaged in an international career of broad scope including performances at Carnegie Hall, Royal Albert Hall, Gewandhaus, La Fenice, the Kennedy Center, and Strathmore. Highlights include performances of Handel's Messiah with the Rogue Symphony Orchestra; Rameau opera with Opera Lafayette in Washington D.C. and Met Museum New York City; Bach's Saint John Passion at Strathmore; French baroque cantatas in Philadelphia with Tempesta di Mare; live film scores for Hollywood's silent movies for Early Music Columbus: and with her newest venture, OpenPage Ensemble, commissioning and performing works of 20th- and 21st-century composers. Her orchestral credits include the Atlanta, Dallas, and Cincinnati Symphony Orchestras, the Smithsonian Chamber Orchestra, and the National Philharmonic.

THE BACH CHOIR OF BETHLEHEM



THE OLDEST AMERICAN BACH CHOIR, The Bach Choir of Bethlehem gave the first complete American performances of Bach's Mass in B Minor in 1900 and Christmas Oratorio in 1901. Since its founding in 1898, the now-famous Choir has been attracting thousands of visitors from across the United States and beyond to the annual Bethlehem Bach Festival in Pennsylvania. Since 1983, under Greg Funfgeld's direction, the 85 dedicated volunteer singers of The Bach Choir of Bethlehem, performing with the Bach Festival Orchestra and distinguished soloists, have received international acclaim. Programming has expanded to 40 concerts and educational programs per year for an audience of more than 22,000. Venues have included the Herkulessaal at Munich's Royal Residence and the Thomaskirche, Bach's church in Leipzig, as part of the 1995 Germany tour; The Kennedy Center and Carnegie Hall as part of The Choir's Centennial Celebration in 1998–2000; the BBC Proms in London's Royal Albert Hall as part of an eight-concert tour of the United Kingdom in 2003; and Severance Hall, Cleveland, for the 75th anniversary of the Baldwin-Wallace Bach Festival in 2007. In September 2011, The Bach Choir represented the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in a 10th anniversary musical observance of 9/11 in New York City, giving concerts in Saint Paul's Chapel and Trinity Church, Wall Street. In 2013, The Choir performed Mendelssohn's Elijah at Strathmore in the Washington D.C. area, and in 2014, the new opera Young Meister Bach for the 250th anniversary of the German Society of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia.

The Choir has released 11 recordings on the Dorian and Analekta labels including most recently *Bach's Cantata 21* (2018), *Handel's Ode for Saint Cecilia's Day* (2018), *A Child's Christmas in Bethlehem* (2013), and *Saint John Passion* (2012). The Choir has been featured on National Public Radio's Performance Today and Prairie Home Companion, Deutsche Radio, the BBC World Service, CBS Sunday Morning, and the Emmy award-winning PBS documentary on The Choir, *Make a Joyful Noise*. It has been recognized for its outstanding educational outreach programs (*Bach at Noon, Bach to School*, and interdisciplinary Family Concerts) by annual awards from the National Endowment for the Arts (2011–2020). The J.S. Bach Foundation in Switzerland named The Bach Choir of Bethlehem as the first American recipient of its annual award to a single Bach organization, recognizingThe Bach Choir's outstanding work in Bach performance and education for young people (2012). *Mr. Bach Comes to Call*, a film based on the acclaimed Classical Kids CD, was co-produced by The Bach Choir of Bethlehem and is distributed internationally by the Children's Group. In July 2018, our affiliated Bel Canto Youth Chorus, currently celebrating its 27th year under the direction of founder Joy Hirokawa, officially merged with The Bach Choir of Bethlehem. Both organizations are looking to increase their impact in training the next generation of choral singers and cultivating a life-long passion for the choral arts.

St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church

St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church in Allentown was founded in 1855 as the first English-speaking Lutheran church in the predominantly immigrant German city. This forward-looking spirit has marked the history of the congregation. The current eighty-foot high cathedral was constructed amid the Great Depression in the 1930s following a unanimous decision by the congregation "to perpetuate its mission in the present location, believing that the voice of the Gospel is needed in the heart of every great city." With the conviction that beauty inspires meaningful worship, the architecture and the entire undertaking blended the religious and the aesthetic. The stained-glass windows, for example, are the creation of Nichola D'Ascenzo whose work is also displayed at the National Cathedral in Washington DC and the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in NYC. Matching the visual splendor of the church has been its long tradition of excellent music. The 5000-pipe Ernest M. Skinner organ with 4 manuals and more than 80 stops is one of the most outstanding instruments in the region. The Arts at St. John's, in its 31st year, is pleased to host as part of its series The Bach Choir of Bethlehem.
